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Plan B!

This year we were faced with a most unusual situation which, thankfully, we were able to sort out very quickly using the experience and expertise, local knowledge, contacts and reputation built up by Hilary and Steve whilst living in The Gambia for several months each year for the last 20+ years. Truly a "Win - Win" as you'll see from Steve's report:-

"PLAN B. - GO AHEAD

In last year's newsletter we mentioned Rumba school which had captured David Wright's enthusiasm for helping. David spent last summer raising £10,000 for the school's renovation. BUT, when we arrived in November we found a Belgian charity had carried out all the improvements at Rumba over the summer!

One phone call to the Education Director in Region 3 (north bank) and we were introduced to **CONTEH KUNDA** Lower Basic - a school in even greater need of assistance! A bad storm in 2019 had badly damaged the roof on one of only three classrooms, Nursery pupils were being taught by rote, sat on the floor outside with a blackboard on the end of the building, and the whole school was in need of improvement.











Thanks to David's efforts we replaced and strengthened the damaged roof, tiled the three classrooms, office, staff room and verandah AND built a new classroom for the nursery children. All completed between November and February when the Jolly Boys (David, George and Trustee Paul) arrived to paint the whole school on their annual visit.

** David's amazing fundraising continues as the teachers have requested living quarters at the school and a water supply for the school garden.**

At the same time as the Conteh Kunda project we commenced work at **KERR NDONGO** Lower Basic School, located less than 10 kilometres away in the same area. We had been contacted by their new headteacher, Mr Jaw, who had been posted there from Loumen, one of the schools we had previously built. When asked which of his many "constraints" should be tackled first he replied "quarters for my guys", as three teachers were sleeping on the floor in one of the offices.



Longtime supporters Anne and Steve Worsman held two very successful fundraising events at Silsden Town Hall last year (and will this year - see page 2) and so the "SILSDEN QUARTERS"

were built to accommodate the headmaster and four of his staff.



The balance of Carolyn Williams legacy (grateful thanks to Simon and Nick Gill for their permission), plus a generous donation from the Hampshire family in Canada, allowed us to carry out roof repairs, tile all six classrooms and the offices, paint the whole school inside and renovate the kitchen. We are hoping to provide them with a library in 2025 by converting an unused structure in the grounds. Thank you to Kebba for his project management and negotiations on materials.



Our last project of the season was at TUJERING Upper and Senior, a huge school with 1800 pupils. When visiting with Joan Ramsden and



Angela Wood, where we delivered several boxes of donated books, we discovered they had nowhere to display them! We did, however, find one unused old classroom where we were able to repair louvred windows, add electrical sockets, provide fans, voile dust curtains and shelving. We decorated, assembled the shelving and displayed the books with help from Anne and Pauline Marshall who were with us for a couple of weeks.



In amongst these "projects" we managed to demolish and rebuild the kitchen at Jamwelly, to repair the storm-damaged walls and roof and complying with the latest World Food Programme (WFP) storage requirements. We also raised the roof by three blocks, thus increasing the height of the teachers quarters at Njalal Samba, to better cope with the much

higher temperatures now experienced inland. With much appreciated thanks to all who helped make this another very successful season"
